

OSCE Checklist | Female Lower Urinary Tract Symptoms

Opening the consultation 1 Wash your hands and don PPE if appropriate 2 Introduce yourself to the patient including your name and role 3 Confirm the patient's name and date of birth Explain that you'd like to take a history from the patient 4 5 Gain consent to proceed with taking a history Presenting complaint 6 Use open questioning to explore the patient's presenting complaint History of presenting complaint 7 Onset: clarify how and when the urinary symptoms started 8 Character: ask about the specific characteristics of the urinary symptoms (storage vs voiding symptoms) 9 Associated symptoms: ask if there are any other associated symptoms (e.g. pain, haematuria, fever, abdominal bloating, menstrual abnormalities, menopausal symptoms) 10 Time course: ask how the urinary symptoms have changed over time (e.g. constant vs episodic symptoms) 11 Exacerbating or relieving factors: identify any triggers for the urinary symptoms and ask if anything makes them worse or better 12 Identify any red flags for malignancy (ovarian cancer, bladder cancer) 13 Explore the patient's ideas, concerns and expectations

14 Summarise the patient's presenting complaint

Systemic enquiry

15 Screen for relevant symptoms in other body systems

Past medical history

- **16** Ask about other medical diagnoses and previous surgical history (e.g. gynaecological surgery)
- **17** Ask if the patient has any allergies and if so, clarify what kind of reaction they had to the substance

Drug history

18 Ask if the patient is currently taking any prescribed medications or over-the-counter remedies

19 Ask if the patient if they're experiencing any side effects from their medication

Family history

20 Ask if there is any relevant family history of urological problems or malignancy

Social history		
21	Explore the patient's general social context (accommodation, who the patient lives with, how the patient manages with activities of daily living, care needs)	
22	Take a smoking history	
23	Take an alcohol history	
24	Ask about recreational drug use	
25	Ask about the patient's occupation and identify any risk factors for bladder cancer	
Closing the consultation		
26	Summarise the salient points of the history back to the patient and ask if they feel that you've missed anything	
27	Thank the patient for their time	
28	Dispose of PPE appropriately and wash your hands
