

## OSCE Checklist | Bimanual vaginal Examination

Introduction			
1	Wash your hands and don PPE if appropriate		
2	Introduce yourself to the patient including your name and role		
3	Confirm the patient's name and date of birth		
4	Explain what the examination will involve using patient-friendly language		
5	Explain the need for a chaperone		
6	Gain consent to proceed with the examination		
7	Ask the patient if they have any pain before proceeding with the clinical examination		
8	Ask the patient to remove their underwear for the examination and provide them with privacy whilst they get undressed		
A	bdominal examination		
9	Perform a brief abdominal examination assessing the nine regions of the abdomen		
Re	eposition the patient		
10	Re-check consent and that the patient is happy to proceed with the examination		
11	Position the patient in the modified lithotomy position		
Vulval examination			
12	Don gloves and an apron		
13	Expose the patient's external genitalia and ensure there is adequate lighting		
14	Palpate the inguinal lymph nodes to identify lymphadenopathy		
15	Inspect the vulva including asking the patient to cough		
Va	aginal examination		
16	Check that the patient is happy to continue with the examination		
17	Perform palpation of the vaginal walls		
18	Perform palpation of the vaginal fornices		
19	Perform palpation of the cervix and assess for cervical motion tenderness		
20	Bimanually palpate the uterus		
21	Bimanually palpate the adnexa		
22	Withdraw fingers and inspect for blood or abnormal discharge		
23	Cover the patient and explain the examination is complete		
24	Dispose of the used equipment into a clinical waste bin		

To complete the examination			
25	Thank the patient for their time		
26	Dispose of PPE appropriately and wash your hands		
27	Summarise your findings		
28	Suggest further assessments and investigations (e.g. urinalysis, speculum examination, vaginal swabs, ultrasound)		

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
